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THE EASTMAN SCHOOL OF MUSIC

Eastman Kodak Company, established the Eastman School of Music in 1921 as the first professional school of the University of Rochester. Through the efforts of Eastman, Howard Hanson (Eastman Director from 1924–1964), and University President Rush Rhees, the Eastman School became an innovator in American music education. The original vision of a music school dedicated to the highest levels of artistry and scholarship, to the broad education of young musicians within the context of a university, to the musical enrichment and education of the greater community, and to the promotion of American music and musicians, is still alive and vital through the Eastman School's numerous creative endeavors. In 1921, George Eastman articulated his belief in the importance of music education in America:

"The life of our communities in the future needs what our schools of music and of other fine arts can give them. It is necessary for people to have an interest in life outside their occupations. ... I am interested in music personally, and I am led thereby to want to share my pleasure with others. It is impossible to buy an appreciation of music. Yet, without appreciation, without the presence of a large body of people who understand music and who get enjoyment out of it, any attempt to develop the musical resources of any city is doomed to failure. Because in Rochester we realize this, we have undertaken a scheme for building musical capacity on a large scale from childhood."

Today, more than 800 students are enrolled in the collegiate division of the Eastman School of Music, including about 475 undergraduates and 325 graduate students. They come from almost every state, and approximately 23% are from other countries. Approximately 250 students enroll yearly, having been selected from nearly 1,800 applicants. They are guided by 83 full-time and 49 part-time faculty members.

The Community Education Division's preparatory and adult education programs have been an integral part of the Eastman School from its beginning. Approximately 1,000 area citizens, ranging in age from 18 months to well over 80 years of age, enroll annually for classes and lessons in the CED.

Graduates of the Eastman School of Music distinguish every aspect of the musical community throughout the world, from the concert stage to the public school classroom, from the recording studio to collegiate classrooms and administrative offices. Eastman's 9,000 alumni are noteworthy for their depth and breadth of training and experience, as well as for their willingness to assist current and graduating students in pursuing their careers.

COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER RONALD L. (RON) CARTER

Racing on Carter is widely recognized as one of the most original and influential bassists in jazz. *Down Beat* magazine describes him as "the epitome of jazz elegance and rectitude," and a master of improvisation. Many of his more than 2,000 jazz recordings are now classics. He was a member of Miles Davis' legendary 1960s quintet, along with Tony Williams, Herbie Hancock, and Wayne Shorter. He also has performed with Cannonball Adderley, Thelonious Monk, Hubert Laws, Lionel Hampton, and Joe Henderson. A superb accompanist for singers, he recorded with Aretha Franklin and Little Jimmy Scott, and played for Lena Horne's New York City appearances in the 1970s. Alongside Dexter Gordon, he appeared in the 1986 film, *Round Midnight*.

While earning his bachelor's at Eastman (1955–59), Ron Carter played in the Eastman Philharmonia and in his own jazz groups around the city. His graduate studies at the Manhattan School of Music coincided with an increasing number of jazz gigs. After earning his master of music degree in 1961, he moved, without a pause, into a dynamic, high-profile career.

Ron Carter's multi-faceted engagement with music exemplifies one of the primary goals of an Eastman education. As a classical performer, he has played with orchestras around the world. He has made four classical recordings, including one that features his own transcriptions and arrangements of Bach chorales and cantatas. In the mid-1970s, he started playing the piccolo bass, rather than the larger jazz bass, in order to "reinvestigate acoustic sounds and to give the public a viable listening option." He has won two Grammy Awards, one in jazz composition and one in jazz performance. He is the producer of 75 recordings. His books include *Building a Jazz Bass Line* and *Music of Ron Carter*, which contains 140 of his published and recorded compositions. He has lectured, conducted, and taught the business of music at numerous universities. For nearly 20 years, he has been Distinguished Professor of Music at the City College of New York.

Carter recently donated more than 700 recordings from his personal collection to Eastman's Sibley Music Library. The recordings, dating from the 1960s–80s, feature Carter frequently as a sideman, sometimes as a leader, with a host of distinguished jazz musicians. This important gift for Sibley puts into place a core jazz repertory that will be of use to Eastman students for generations to come.

Today, Ron Carter will be receiving the University of Rochester's Hutchison Medal. Recognizing outstanding achievements and service to community, state, or nation, it is the highest honor the University gives its alumni.

ORCHESTRAL STUDIES DIPLOMA IN STRINGS AWARDED MAY 2002

NSTITUTED BY THE EASTMAN SCHOOL in 1999, and offered in partnership with the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra (RPO), the Orchestral Studies Diploma in Strings prepares advanced students for careers in today's competitive orchestral marketplace. At the heart of the program is the Orchestral Studies String Fellowship, which gives students performing experience with the RPO on six to 10 classical subscription concerts each year. Students also learn the non-performing, "behind the scenes" side of professional orchestras through internships in the orchestra's administrative offices and Arts Leadership courses taught by Eastman faculty and RPO musicians and staff.

Through this special curriculum that combines high artistic standards and practical experience, the program strives to prepare students for the professional worlds that they will be entering. It encourages them to become skilled and artistic instrumentalists, as well as creative, free thinkers and forward-looking leaders not only in orchestra-related issues, but in music and music education in general. The Orchestral Studies Diploma in Strings is supported by a generous grant from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation.
