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## THE EASTMAN SCHOOL OF MUSIC

NDUSTRIALIST AND PHILANTHROPIST GEORGE EASTMAN, FOUNDER OF Eastman Kodak Company, established the Eastman School of Music in 1921 as the first professional school of the University of Rochester. Through the efforts of Eastman, Howard Hanson (Eastman Director from 1924–1964), and University President Rush Rhees, the Eastman School became an innovator in American music education. The original vision of a music school dedicated to the highest levels of artistry and scholarship, to the broad education of young musicians within the context of a university, to the musical enrichment and education of the greater community, and to the promotion of American music and musicians, is still alive and vital through the Eastman School's numerous creative endeavors.

In 1921, George Eastman articulated his belief in the importance of music education in America. "The life of our communities in the future needs what our schools of music and of other fine arts can give them. It is necessary for people to have an interest in life outside their occupations ... I am interested in music personally, and I am led thereby to want to share my pleasure with others. It is impossible to buy an appreciation of music. Yet, without appreciation, without the presence of a large body of people who understand music and who get enjoyment out of it, any attempt to develop the musical resources of any city is doomed to failure. Because in Rochester we realize this, we have undertaken a scheme for building musical capacity on a large scale from childhood."

Today, more than 900 students are enrolled in the Collegiate Division of the Eastman School of Music—about 500 undergraduates and 400 graduate students. They come from almost every state, and over 40 countries. Each year about 280 students enroll, selected from more than 2,100 applicants. They are guided by more than 95 full-time faculty members. Seven Pulitzer Prize winners have taught at Eastman, as have several Grammy Award winners.

The Community Education Division's preparatory and adult education programs have been an integral part of the Eastman School from its beginning. Approximately 1,000 area citizens, ranging from 18 months to well over 80 years of age, enroll annually for classes and lessons in the CED.

Graduates of the Eastman School of Music distinguish every aspect of the musical community throughout the world, from the concert stage to the public school classroom, from the recording studio to collegiate classrooms and administrative offices. Eastman's 10,000 alumni are noteworthy for their depth and breadth of training and experience, as well as for their willingness to assist current and graduating students in pursuing their careers.

# COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER MARK VOLPE

ARK VOLPE WAS APPOINTED MANAGING DIRECTOR OF THE BOSton Symphony Orchestra in September 1997. Since that time, Mr. Volpe has steered the BSO through a historic transition in music leadership — he oversaw the end of Seiji Ozawa's 29-year tenure as Music Director and the engaging of James Levine as his successor; led a record-breaking capital campaign, raising more than \$150 million for the BSO's endowment, capital improvements and annual fund; and presided



over three successful labor negotiations. During his tenure as Managing Director, the BSO's endowment has grown significantly and the restoration of the physical plants at Symphony Hall and Tanglewood is ongoing. Also under Mr. Volpe's management, the BSO developed its website, www.bso.org, into the largest and most visited orchestral website in the world with close to 8 million unique visitors each year; celebrated the centennial of Symphony Hall, widely regarded as one of the finest concert halls in the world; and greatly enhanced

the orchestra's media exposure on major outlets including CBS, FOX, PBS, NHK, BBC, NPR, Dreamworks and Radio France through widely publicized performances such as the Boston Symphony's Millennium Concert in Paris and the Boston Pops' appearance at Super Bowl XXXVI. Recently, the BSO successfully launched its own recording label under Mr. Volpe's leadership. Prior to being named Managing Director of the BSO, Mr. Volpe had served as Executive Director of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, Vice President and General Manager of the Minnesota Orchestra, and General Manager of the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra.

While in Detroit, Mr. Volpe's leadership was credited with restoring the orchestra's fiscal integrity, reviving its recording tradition with 26 releases in five years, developing and implementing educational and affirmative-action programs, and overseeing critically acclaimed appearances by the orchestra in a host of venues, ranging from the Lucerne Festival to Carnegie Hall to the Hollywood Bowl. Mr. Volpe also helped design and launch a \$200 million Orchestra Place development project in Detroit, which includes an expansion to Detroit's Orchestra Hall, a high school for the performing arts, an office building that serves as the headquarters for the Detroit Medical Center, a restaurant, and a 1,000-car parking structure.

In his role with the Minnesota Orchestra, Mr. Volpe's major accomplishments included successful and amicable labor negotiations on a three-year collective bargaining agreement with both the orchestra's musicians and stagehands. He was also responsible for negotiating television and recording contracts with Disney Studios, Virgin Classics, and Angel-EMI, as well as organizing all foreign and domestic touring activities. Mr. Volpe was a key player in the orchestra's successful turn-around, where he focused his energy on rebuilding relationships among the various orchestra constituencies as well as playing a supporting role in the orchestra's successful \$40 million endowment/deficit retirement campaign.

Mr. Volpe obtained his Juris Doctorate cum laude from the University of Minnesota Law School in 1983. He received his Bachelor's degree in Music with a major in Clarinet Performance from the Eastman School of Music in 1979, and did graduate work at the Indiana University School of Music. Mr. Volpe holds honorary degrees from Northeastern University and New England Conservatory of Music. Mr. Volpe and his wife Martha have two children, Francesca and Madeline.

at 17 with the Chicago Symphony and the Juilliard Orchestra in Avery Fisher Hall, her career has taken her to all 50 states and to major cities of Western and Eastern Europe, Indonesia, Korea, Japan, Mexico, Iceland, New Zealand, Brazil, Australia, Canada, and to Hong Kong and Singapore. She has been a visiting professor at the St. Petersburg Conservatory in Russia and has traveled to the People's Republic of

China more than 20 times for recitals and master classes. She has played recitals on French national television and on Australian national radio, and has recorded more than 100 works.

A Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of Michigan, where she studied with Helen Titus, True studied at Juilliard with Sascha Gorodnitzki and then earned a DMA with Leon Fleisher at the Peabody Conservatory. In Paris, she studied with Nadia Boulanger on a Fulbright grant.

True's students have won top prizes at national and international competitions, including an unprecedented five First Prizes in national-level Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) competitions. Zhang Zuo, an Eastman junior now studying with

True, is one of only 30 students competing in the prestigious 2009 Van Cliburn International Piano Competition.

Among True's awards are the Certificate of Merit from the University of Michigan Alumni Association, Eastman's Eisenhart Award for Excellence in Teaching, the 2002 Achievement Award from MTNA, and a Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Keyboard Pedagogy Conference.

#### HONORARY DOCTOR OF MUSIC DEGREE CHRISTOPHER SEAMAN

N HIS ELEVENTH SEASON AS MUSIC DIRECTOR OF THE ROCHESTER PHIL-harmonic Orchestra, Christopher Seaman is internationally recognized as one of classical music's leading conductors. The native of Great Britain is a highly sought after guest conductor, whose United States engagements have included the orchestras of San Francisco, Pittsburgh, Houston, Detroit, Columbus, Seattle, and Utah. He has become an integral part of the greater Rochester community, and is recognized as



having raised the artistic level of the Orchestra to its present excellence. He is a champion of strong connections with the Eastman School of Music, and an indefatigable supporter of a renovated Eastman Theatre.

Seaman is noted for his command of a broad repertoire and has performed internationally with all the London orchestras, the City of Birmingham Symphony, the Bournemouth Symphony, the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic, the Royal Scottish National Orchestra, the Ulster Orchestra, and several BBC orchestras.

He also has led the symphony orchestras of Budapest, Prague, Warsaw, Trondheim, and the North German Philharmonic.

Before joining the RPO, he was conductor-in-residence of the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra. He also has been the principal conductor of the BBC Scottish Symphony and of the Northern Sinfonia.

His recordings include performances with the Royal Philharmonic, the Philharmonia Orchestra, and the National Youth Orchestra of Britain. He has recorded two CDs with the RPO—one with pianist Jon Nakamatsu, and one with pianist Olga Kern.

NSTITUTED BY THE EASTMAN SCHOOL IN 1999, AND OFFERED IN PARTnership with the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra (RPO), the
Orchestral Studies Diploma in Strings prepares advanced students
for careers in today's competitive orchestral marketplace. At the heart of
the program is the Orchestral Studies String Fellowship, which gives students performing experience with the RPO on ten classical subscription
concerts each year. Students also learn the non-performing, "behind the
scenes" side of professional orchestras through internships in the orchestra's administrative offices and Arts Leadership courses taught by Eastman
faculty and RPO musicians and staff.

Through this special curriculum that combines high artistic standards and practical experience, the program strives to prepare students for the professional worlds that they will be entering. It encourages them to become skilled and artistic instrumentalists, as well as creative, free-thinking, and forward-looking leaders not only in orchestra-related issues, but also in music and music education in general.
