³ There are two components of the thesis: 1) an extended composition for ensemble prepared under the guidance of the thesis advisor, and 2) an essay on a philosophical, analytical, or theoretical topic relevant to the art and/or craft of contemporary composition. The complete thesis will be reviewed by a committee of faculty who will evaluate the work. The committee's approval of the thesis is a necessary prerequisite to degree conferral.

⁴ Students are required to present a 30-minute lecture on their own music and progress toward the degree, followed by a question and answer session. This lecture will function as a comprehensive review and will be evaluated by the Eastman composition faculty. The lecture will occur during the final semester of the student's course of studies. The departmental chair will schedule the lecture as part of a regular meeting of the weekly Composition Symposium.
