### In Oak and Iron, New Pipe Organ Sounds Echo of Age of Bach

The ceremonial pipe organ of the 18th century was the Formula One racer of its time, a masterpiece of human ingenuity so elegant in its outward appearance that a casual observer could only guess at the complexity that lay within. . . .

The effect was breathtaking. "Each instrument speaks to you in a different way," said Hans Davidsson, a concert organist, sitting before the console of the organ at the cavernous Christ Church, Episcopal, in Rochester. Dr. Davidsson began to play the Bach hymn "Gottes Sohn Ist Kommen" ("The Son of God Is Coming"), and an enormous, bell-clear sound exploded from the gleaming pipes that soared above him.

The organ, the Craighead-Saunders, is a unique instrument, not only because of its lovely sound, but also because it is a nearly exact copy of a late Baroque organ built by Adam Gottlob Casparini of East Prussia in 1776. The original stands in the Holy Ghost Church in Vilnius, Lithuania. . . .

The project to build a replica of the Vilnius organ began in 2000 at the **Eastman School of Music** at the University of Rochester, but Eastman had long wanted a new instrument for Christ Church. David Higgs, a concert organist and head of the Eastman organ department, had been seeking one for years. (Also reported by The Chronicle Herald.)

### Democrat & Chronicle (December 3) Grammy nominees include Jars of Clay, Renee Fleming

Two of the usual suspects — Jars of Clay and Renée Fleming — are among musicians with local ties who appear on the 2010 Grammy nominee lists released today. As is often the case, **Eastman School of Music** grads are scattered throughout the classical categories: nine alumni this year.

Churchville native Renee Fleming, a soprano who holds a master's degree from **Eastman**, appears on two classical albums nominated for awards. Best Classical Vocal Performance features her work on Verismo. For Best Classical Crossover Album nominee Yo-Yo Ma & Friends: Songs of Joy and Peace, she joins a musically diverse lineup that includes Chris Botti, Dave Brubeck, Diana Krall, Alison Krauss, Joshua Redman and James Taylor, among others, in backing the famed cellist. Fleming is a two-time Grammy winner.

She is one of nine **Eastman** grads on the list. In Best Classical Crossover, she'll be going against **Eastman** alums Ben Wendel, Shane Endsley, Kaveh Rastegar and Adam Benjamin, all members of the Kneebody, and that quintet's recording, Twelve Songs by Charles Ives.

Kristian Bezuidenhout, playing harpsichord and organ on Vivaldi: Violin Concertos, featuring Daniel Hope and Anne Sofie von Otter, with the Chamber Orchestra Of Europe, is nominated for Best Small Ensemble Performance. Anthony Dean Griffey appears on Mahler: Symphony No. 8; Adagio From Symphony No. 10, nominated for the Best Classical Album and Best Choral Performance. Faith Sherman appears on the John Musto's Wolf Trap Opera recording of Volpone. The John Hollenbeck Large Ensemble, led by Hollenbeck, who earned his **Eastman** bachelor's and master's degrees in 1990-91, is up for Best Large Jazz Ensemble Album for Eternal Interlude. Bill Cunliffe was nominated for Best Instrumental

It's been a year of both triumph and turmoil on the regional arts and entertainment scene.

The house that George built: 'Kodak Hall' opens WHAT'S UP? In October, the **Eastman School of Music** welcomed guests to its renovated concert hall, now titled "Kodak Hall at Eastman Theatre." Renovations eliminated some 800 seats on the orchestra level, while adding two-story box seating and a small lounge area. There's also new carpeting, restored and refurbished seating, enhanced house and exit lighting and sound and more — plus a new addition for the **Eastman School of Music**. The theater renovations, partly

funded by \$10 million from Eastman Kodak, were designed to improve acoustics and make the theater an overall more intimate venue to hear music. (The state also footed \$13 million.) The Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra inaugurated the newly renovated venue with its Philharmonics season opener Oct. 8, which included the premiere of Douglas Lowry's "Geo," an homage to the theater's designer and community benefactor George Eastman.

### Long Beach Press-Telegram (Dec. 31) Ying Quartet tackles the classics

Phillip Ying remembers when he and his three siblings first sat down to play string quartets, long before any of them had any idea that the Ying Quartet would become world famous in chamber music. . . .

The Cleveland Quartet was the resident quartet at the **Eastman School of Music** in Rochester, N.Y.

"We came to the **Eastman School** because we were each interested in studying with one of the faculty members here," said Ying. "We were off doing our own things in the years before that.

"An all-sibling quartet was an idea that was in the back of our minds," he said. "We kind of thought it would be fun to try, and then we dismissed it as maybe a little bit too much like the Jackson 5 or something like that. We realized by all coming to **Eastman**, we would finally have a chance to see if it would work or not. And the Cleveland Quartet were very encouraging to us."
