# Music Review | Alarm Will Sound: A Classical Approach to Electronic Sounds

It is hard to tell whether Alarm Will Sound is finding itself or losing itself, but it may be a bit of both. A reasonably straightforward new-music band in 2001, when it made the jump from college orchestra (at the **Eastman School of Music** in Rochester) to professional ensemble, it has preserved its freshness by thinking about repertory in ways that most groups do not. . . .

Stefan Freund's eerily dreamy "kinda asleep" is a fantasy on sections of "The Little Death, Vol. 1," an opera by Matt Marks, Alarm Will Sound's hornist. And Caleb Burhans's melancholy "oh ye of little faith ... (do you know where your children are?)" moves deftly from gentle Minimalist scale figures to electric-guitar power chords, touching on murky brass figures along the way. Mr. Burhans's work was written for Alice Tully Hall's reopening festivities this year. It delivered a more visceral punch in the tighter confines of Le Poisson Rouge.

#### Inside Eastman School's Summer Conducting Institute

# The Times Record (July 9) Festival features professional debut

The Bowdoin International Music Festival's July 10 Festival Fridays concert will present the American debut of Tamsin Waley-Cohen, a British-American violin soloist who has performed extensively worldwide.

The program will open with Brahms' second Piano Quartet, featuring Barry Snyder on piano. Snyder was a triple prize winner in the 1966 Van Cliburn International Competition, and has been a member of the Eastman Trio (1976-82) and the Meadowmount Trio (1989-90). Snyder's Eastman School of Music colleagues Mikhail Kopleman, violin, and Rosemary Elliot, cello, will join him for the performance. Former festival viola Fellow Milena Pajaro-van de Stadt will round out the group.

The Grammy award-winning **Ying Quartet** is also on the evening program, presenting Dvorák's always popular "American" String Quartet. (Note: the Ying Quartet is Eastman School's string quartet in residence and its members are on the School's faculty.)

# Charles Castleman's Quartet Program brings reputation, talented students to Boulder

Charles Castleman's Quartet Program is the major moveable feast in American music.

Castleman, concert violinist and head of the string division at the **Eastman School**, is one of the country's most respected string teachers. He launched the Quartet Program in 1970 at Saratoga, New York, summer home of the Philadelphia Orchestra. Since then he has taken it to a number of locations.

This summer the program is at home in Fredonia, New York, and -- for the second consecutive summer -- here in Boulder, where the University of Colorado is its host.

Last week 28 students -- largely high-school and college age -- arrived here for four weeks of intensive training in chamber music. . . .

"The Quartet Program is the best program of its kind that I know," says renowned cellist Yo-Yo Ma. "Every young person in it not only learns many of the great works written for this genre, but they also learn how to work with each other and to communicate their most personal thoughts to their colleagues.

"No one emerges from the program without great love of music and better knowledge of interpersonal relationships. I view this program as a training ground for Lifemanship."

### Democrat & Chronicle (July 12) Life lived: Donald Coley 1933-2009

Kristin West recalls fondly the day when Donald Coley, her clarinet teacher at Brighton High School, told her that she had won the "Coley Scholarship," entitling her to a weekly one-hour private lesson during her senior year.

Coley had been her teacher since fourth grade. He selected a clarinet for her in New York City. He encouraged her to use her abilities. When she told him she was interested in teaching, he let her shadow him when he taught younger grades, even allowing her to help with lessons. He knew she needed two instruments to perform in an orchestra, and he knew the family didn't have money for additional lessons.

"I thought there really was such a thing," she says of the Coley Scholarship. Only much later did she learn that Don Coley offered free lessons to many promising students.

Over hundreds and hundreds of lessons, says West, who now teaches music, and clarinet in particular, in the Fairport schools, "he never raised his voice. He was always kind and nurturing. He gave me his time, and without him, I would not have become a teacher."

Coley, who died in May, was 76. He earned bachelor's and master's degrees at the **Eastman School of Music**. He served briefly in the U.S. Army and played in the United States Military Academy Band at West Point before starting his teaching career in Brighton in 1959.

At the Eastman School, Coley was cited for his performance skills but he preferred teaching, says his daughter Pamela McCann of Pittsfield, Mass., one of four Coley siblings.

# New book examines exotic influences in classical music

A new book about music challenges long-held assumptions about classical music. ### UB Post - Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia (July 17) Renowned Conductor Wows Mongolia

World famous guest conductor Shinik Hahm held concerts last week on June 9 and 10 in the State Philharmonic hall. The Mongolian audiences were enthralled with Hahm, as he displayed his classic music talents with performances composed by world classic composers, including Brahms, Rossini, Verdi, and Weber. . . .

Hahm is also a Professor of Conducting at Yale, where he is also director of the orchestral conducting program.

While pursuing his conducting studies at the **Eastman School of Music**, Hahm founded the Gibbs Orchestra. His musicianship and entrepreneurial talents led it to grow from a chamber ensemble to a full-sized professional orchestra within four years.

Maestro Hahm has received a variety of honors and awards, including the Fourth Gregor Fitelberg International Competition for conductors, the Walter Hagen Conducting Prize from the **Eastman School of Music**, and the Shepherd Society Award from Rice University. In 1997, he was part of a select group of conductors to appear at the American Symphony Orchestra League's National Conductor Preview.

Guitarist Gabe Condon just graduated from Penfield High School, but his resume is already overflowing with awards. The Outstanding Performance Award from Downbeat Magazine and the Outstanding Soloist Award from the Mingus Competition at the Manhattan School of Music are but a few. His guitar prowess has just won him the Gerry Niewood Scholarship (given by the Xerox Rochester International Jazz Festival) to attend the **Eastman School of Music**. A student of Bob Sneider, Condon is poised to take his place in the next generation of jazz guitarists.

Rick Braun could afford to celebrate his birthday just about anywhere in the world with the success he has had as a smooth jazz trumpeter. Last year he chose Tucson. For his 53rd, Braun packed his wife and kids in the family RV and headed to the Old Pueblo for a concert held by the Tucson Jazz Society in his honor. ## Paisley Daily Express, United Kingdom (July 30) Toni hits the right note!

Toni James began to tinkle the ivories at her grandmother's house when she was just five years old.

And she was just 11 when she knew she wanted to study piano. . . . . Now aged 23, Toni knows she made the right choice as she has a long list of musical achievements under her belt and plenty more sure to come.

When she was 15, she was selected to represent the RSAMD in the Junior Intercollegiate Beethoven Competition in London. Then, in 2001, Toni was a gold medallist in her class at the Moray Piano Festival.

She was a finalist in the BBC Young Musician of the Year piano class in 2004 when she was aged 18 and was the winner of the regional final for Scotland and Northern Ireland. In March 2005, at the International Emmanuel Durlet Prize for Piano in Antwerp, Belgium, Toni reached the semi-final as the youngest competitor in the event.

Toni achieved four A grade Highers at Castlehead High School in Paisley and then applied to the RSAMD when she was just 16 to study music performance. She stayed on to study for a post-graduate certificate in music and then, in 2007, she applied to **Eastman School of Music** in New York state – one of the top music schools in America. Toni was accepted on to the Master of Music Performance course and graduated in May. Now she is getting ready to go back to **Eastman** as one of only eight pianists to be accepted on to the Doctorate in Music course.
